
"I was bought up with Oaks from a very young child, and regard them as part of the English landscape and indeed history. We all have a responsibility to preserve and save these wonderful trees"


"It built the houses of our nation,


## Lethal action (47%)

Non-lethal action (30%)




Lethal action (30%)
